2024 PIAA BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

MECHANICSBURG – The 2024 PIAA Basketball Championships saw 24 teams battle it out to crown 12 champions, six girls’ teams and six boys’ teams over three days of competition. It was an electric atmosphere in Chocolatetown. This was the 104th Annual PIAA Boys’ Basketball Championships and the 51st Annual PIAA Girls’ Basketball Championship.

The Giant Center has been home to the Girls and Boys Basketball Championships for 15-years. This championship saw more than 19,000 fans in attendance to watch the student-athletes represent their schools and perform on the championship stage.

During games on Friday and Saturday, numerous awards were presented. PIAA and the Pennsylvania Cable Network, in conjunction with a grant from the PA Office of the Attorney General, challenged students across the state to create 30 second public service announcements to educate classmates on the dangers of opioid abuse. Over 37 classrooms participated in the competition since January 1st.

Mia Patino, of New Hope-Solebury High School, had the winning commercial to help spread awareness on the fight against opioid abuse in Pennsylvania. Mia was the lead producer on their spot entitled, “The Monster.” Mia won \$1,000 for the New Hope-Solebury TV Studio. Her spot will run statewide on PCN’s live and streamed coverage of the PIAA State Championships through January 2025.

The runner up was from Indiana County Technology Center, Lead Producer Lizzy Dillon. Lizzy’s spot entitled “Be the Reflection” has earned her school \$500 to upgrade their equipment. Lizzy was joined by Indian County Technology Center Administrative Director Michael J. McDermott to receive her award and \$500 check to enhance their program.

The PIAA Award of Merit is in recognition of an individual’s years of service to the PIAA, its member schools, student-athletes, and registered sports officials. This year, there were three recipients as the PIAA was honored to bestow the 2024 Award of Merit to Franklin C. Hoke, Dennis F. Nemes and Walter J. Blucas. Frank is a graduate of West York HS and York College. He served on the Penn Manor School Board for five years.

Dennis served on the PIAA District 11 Committee for 30 years and the PIAA Board of Directors as the Principals Representative for 27 years. He also served an additional two years on the Board as the Private School Representative.

The other PIAA Award of Merit went to Mr. Walter J. Blucas. "Wally" was a graduate of Jenner-Boswell HS and went to IUP where he was a star quarterback leading them to a birth in the Boardwalk Bowl vs. Delaware. Wally started his career in education at Karns City HS where he was also the head football coach. He moved to Girard School District where he spent 28 years as an administrator and culminated his career as Superintendent.

Wally spent 40 years on the District X Committee with 32 of them as District X's chairman. He also served 32 years on the PIAA Board of Directors and 8 years as the President of PIAA. Wally's service to the Association is unmatched and his leadership, insight and integrity has helped the Association flourish.
