49th ANNUAL PIAA SOFTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

MECHANICSBURG - The 2024 PIAA Softball Championships are scheduled to be contested at Beard Field, Penn State University, University Park, PA starting Thursday, June 13th, 2024, through Friday, June 14th, 2024. This is the 49th Annual PIAA Softball Championship.

PIAA began sponsoring softball in 1975 and held its first championship at Ferreira Field, Topton, Berks County. Parkland HS won the inaugural title in 1975 with a 3-2 win over Coatesville HS. The championships have been held at five different sites: Ferreira Field (1975), Shippensburg University (1976-88, 1990-92, 1995-2010), Little League Park, Altoona (1989), Elm Park, Williamsport (1993-94), and Beard Field, Nittany Lion Softball Park, Penn State University (2011-present).

The PIAA Softball Championships started with one classification and quickly grew to 2A and 3A in 1979. Softball and baseball both expanded three more times since the sports adoption by the PIAA. In 1999, the first 1A championship was held. In 2005, 4A was added. Then, in 2017, stretching to six classifications.
