52nd ANNUAL PIAA BOYS' SOCCER/33rd GIRLS' SOCCER CHAMPIONSHIPS

MECHANICSBURG - The 2025 PIAA Boys' and Girls' Soccer Championships are scheduled to be contested at Bobcat Stadium on the campus of Northeastern High School, Manchester, Pa on Friday, November 14, 2025, and Saturday, November 15, 2025. This facility possesses a first-class artificial turf and a maximum field size of 70 yards by 120 yards.

This is the 52nd PIAA Boys' Soccer Championships and the 33rd PIAA Girls' Soccer Championships. In the history of the championships, boys' soccer stayed a single classification for 11 seasons. In 1985, boys' soccer expanded to two classifications and expanded two more times. In 2000, it expanded to three classifications, and then again in 2016 to four classifications to include 4A. The girls spent just three seasons with one classification before expanding to two in 1996. Girls' soccer expanded to three classes in 2010 and to the present four classifications in 2016.

The championships were held at multiple sites in the same years, finding sites that were neutral for each of the schools competing was a challenge. The soccer championships have been held at 11 different sites: Reading (1973-1980), Shippensburg University (1981-85, 1988-94, 1996-97), Cedar Crest High School (1986-87), Northern Lebanon County High School (1987), Marple Newtown High School (1988), O.J. Roberts High School (1992), Mansion Park (1995), Messiah College (1996), HersheyPark Stadium (1997-21), Cumberland Valley High School (2022-2024), and Northeastern High School.

Girls' soccer began with two sports seasons. It was the only sport to be offered in different seasons. For the first 19 years, schools could decide whether to play in the fall or in the spring.

The final spring soccer championship was held in 2012 before the Board of Directors approved of moving all competition to one season, the fall. From 2007 to 2010, there were two classifications, 2A and 3A. While girls' soccer was played in the spring, there were 15 different champions: (Central Bucks West (1993-1996, 2003, 2006-07), Emmaus (1997), Council Rock (1998, 2002), Pennsbury (1999), Hempfield (2000), Penn Manor (2002, 2005), Council Rock South (2004), Dallas (2007), Central Dauphin (2007-08), Lancaster Mennonite (2008), Lower Dauphin (2009), Donegal (2009-10), Hershey (2010), Cumberland Valley (2011-12). There were two co-champions in 2002 and 2007.
