37th ANNUAL PIAA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

MECHANICSBURG - The 2025 PIAA Football Championships are scheduled to be contested at Chapman Stadium on the campus of Cumberland Valley School District on Thursday, December 4, 2025, through Saturday, December 6, 2025. This facility was renovated in 2022 and possesses a first-class artificial turf, multimillion dollar scoreboard and spacious amenities. Each team has access to full locker rooms, coaches rooms, athletic training facilities and an indoor artificial turf.

This is the 37th PIAA Football Championships. Prior to 1988, there were no statewide championships held. With a large number of member schools sponsoring football, the sport began with four classifications. In 2016, football expanded to six classifications.

The championships were held at multiple sites in the same years. The football championships have been held at nine different sites: Penn State (1988), HersheyPark Stadium (1988-90, 1998-21), Mansion Park, Altoona (1988, 1991-1997), Shippensburg University (1988), Memorial Stadium, Middletown (1989-90), Lackawanna County Stadium (1991), South Stadium, Pittsburgh (1991), Memorial Stadium, Wilkes-Barre (1991) and Cumberland Valley High School (2022-present).
