Area School District. Both squads come together for a good cause to encourage attendance and work together to raise money for this amazing cause.

In addition, Freedom Cheer volunteers arrive at school early and plant remembrance flags at the 9/11 Never Forget Project annually and assists in making Christmas cards given to residents at a local nursing home.

At the final fall pep rally every year, Freedom puts on a “Co-Ed Cheer” performance, inviting senior boys to participate. They have several practices then perform a 2-minute competition routine. This year they set another attendance record with 40 senior boys participating! They had a great time and embraced the experience, even wearing cheer uniforms. The students and faculty loved it so much, they asked for an encore performance. The senior boys who participated expressed gratitude for the opportunity, and a newfound appreciation for the hard work this cheer team puts in.

The Champion Spirit Awards began in 2013-14 and since, has honored 13 coaches and 12 teams.
